FARM SERVICE AGENCY (FSA) PROGRAMS IMPORTANT INFORMATION & DATES

Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP)—A type of crop insurance that provides financial assistance to producers of crops that are not insurable through Federal Crop Insurance, to protect against natural disasters that result in lower yields or crop losses or prevents crop planting.

Emergency Conservation Program (ECP)—Provides emergency funding and technical assistance to farmers and ranchers to rehabilitate farmland and conservation structures damaged by natural disasters and implement emergency water conversation measures in periods of severe drought.

Emergency Forest Restoration Program (EFRP)—Provides payments to eligible owners of nonindustrial private forest (NIPF) land in order to carry out emergency measures to restore land damaged by a natural disaster.

Tree Assistance Program (TAP)—Provides financial assistance to qualifying orchardists and nursery tree growers to replant or rehabilitate eligible trees, bushes, and vines damaged by natural disasters.

Livestock Indemnity Program (LIP)—Provides benefits to livestock producers for livestock deaths in excess of normal mortality caused by adverse weather or by attacks by animals reintroduced into the wild by the federal government.

Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honeybees, and Farm-Raised Fish (ELAP)—Provides emergency assistance to eligible producers of livestock, honeybees and farm-raised fish for losses due to disease (including cattle tick fever), adverse weather, or other conditions, such as blizzards and wildfires, not covered by LFP and LIP.

Continuous Conservation Reserve Program (CRP)—A voluntary program that contracts with agricultural producers so that environmentally sensitive agricultural land is devoted to conservation benefits. CRP participants establish long-term, resource-conserving vegetative species, such as approved grasses or trees (known as "covers"), to control soil erosion, improve the water quality and enhance wildlife habitat. In return, FSA provides participants with annual rental payments and cost-share assistance. Continuous signup enrollment contracts are 10 to 15 years in duration.

Organic Certification Cost Share Program (OCCSP)—FSA will cover up to 75% of organic certification costs at a maximum of \$750 per certification category. FSA is now accepting applications, and organic producers and handlers should apply for OCCSP by the Oct. 31, 2024, deadline for eligible expenses incurred from Oct. 1, 2023, to Sept. 30, 2024. FSA will issue payments as applications are received and approved.

FARM LOAN PROGRAMS (FLP)

Applying for FSA Direct Loans

loans to producers who want to establish, maintain, or strengthen their farm or ranch. Direct loans are processed, approved and serviced by FSA loan officers.

Direct farm operating loans can be used to purchase livestock and feed, farm equipment, fuel, farm chemicals, insurance, and other costs including family living expenses. Operating loans can also be used to finance minor improvements or repairs to buildings and to refinance some farm-related debts, excluding real estate.

Direct farm ownership loans can be used to purchase FSA Offers Loan Servicing Options buildings, and to make farm improvements.

FSA offers direct farm ownership and direct farm operating The maximum loan amount for direct farm ownership loans is \$600,000 and the maximum loan amount for direct operating loans is \$400,000 and a down payment is not required. Repayment terms vary depending on the type of loan, collateral and the producer's ability to repay the loan.

> Operating loans are normally repaid within seven years and farm ownership loans are not to exceed 40 years.
